- All goods imported into the European Union (EU) must be declared to the customs authorities of the respective Member State using the Single Administrative Declaration form for all the Member States, laid down in the Union Customs Code (UCC) adopted in Regulation (EU) No 952/2013 of the European Parliament and of the Council (OJ L-269 07/10/2013) (CELEX 32013R0952) and the UCC Transitional Delegated Act adopted in Commission Delegated Regulation No 2016/341 (OJ L-69 15/03/2016) (CELEX 32016R0341).
- The declaration must be drawn up in one of the official languages of the EU, which is acceptable to the customs authorities of the Member State where the formalities are carried out.
- The SAD may be presented either by:
 - Using an approved computerised system linked to Customs authorities; or
 - Lodging it with the designated Customs Office premises.
